Palm Sunday, April 14th

8:30 & 10am Blessing of the Palms by bell tower with procession into the church, Holy Eucharist with the Passion story.

Palm Cross Making, April 14th

9:15am and 11:15am, all ages in Parish Hall for Palm cross making

Holy Wednesday, April 17th

10:30am regular Wednesday service — no bible study.

7:30pm, Contemplative Liturgy — Lay Led — No Communion

The Triduum (Three days) --

Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter Vigil/Easter Sunday

The Triduum is the sacred three days. It begins on the evening of Thursday, April 18 and ends with Easter evening, April 21st.

More practically our 7:30pm Maundy Thursday service begins the Triduum and ends after church on Easter morning unless you count Easter brunch as part of the holy three.

They are a powerful three days. We start with washing hands and then move to stripping the Altar on Thursday evening. We come back the next day to a barren church and try to grow comfortable with “absence” on Friday. We are back Saturday to watch and pray; to ring and celebrate Easter during the Vigil or on Sunday morning.

Unless you are a priest, you typically don't do Saturday evening and Sunday morning in the same year. Saturday and Sunday are properly Easter services. This year why don't you do the trifecta? Come Thursday and Friday and then return Saturday or Sunday.

Saturday

Bring your bells if you are coming on Saturday evening. If you don't have a bell, we have a few. We will literally ring in Easter on Saturday evening.

Or Sunday

Bring your scavenger hunt brain if you are coming Sunday morning. We will have an all-family "Easter Scavenger Hunt" instead of an Egg Hunt.

7:30pm – there will be incense outside, but no incense in the church. Bring your bells.

April 21st the Big Day

Easter Sunday Morning

7:30am Worship starts on Labyrinth and continues in the church for sermon and Communion

9am Easter Music and Communion

10am Patio Fellowship (weather permitting)
with "Easter Scavenger Hunt"

11am Easter Music and Communion
"Easter Scavenger Hunt"

FUN FACTS ABOUT NEW ORLEANS CULTURE

Jazz - the sound that put New Orleans on the map, musically speaking! It's a distinctive sound. New Orleans jazz is a style of music. Almost any song can be "jazzed up" with a New Orleans beat. Jazz was originally music for dancing, not listening, even though that is what modern jazz became in the 1950s and beyond. New Orleans jazz has a swinging, stomping, syncopated beat that makes you want to dance! It has a simple melodic quality that, to some, sounds dated.

New Orleans jazz is also played by brass bands--the kind we hear in our Mardi Gras street parades. They rely on wind instruments and separate bass and snare drums, all of which can be carried on foot.

What sets jazz apart from the music that preceded it is the way the first jazz musicians improvised. The music became a vehicle of personal expression for both musicians and dancers.

Second line – a tradition in brass band parades in New Orleans. The “main line” or “first line” is the main section of the parade club with the parading permit, as well as the brass band. Those who follow the band to enjoy the music are called the “second line”. The second line’s style of traditional dance, in which participants walk and sometimes twirl a parasol or handkerchief in the air, is called “second lining”. It’s the quintessential New Orleans art form – a jazz funeral without a body.

NOLA – short for New Orleans, Louisiana

The Big Easy - In the early 1900s there was a dance hall in New Orleans called “The Big Easy.” The nickname became famous in the early 1970s when a Louisiana newspaper writer compared the easy-going way of life in New Orleans to the hurried pace of life in New York City.

Bayou (by' you) Slow stream, or body of water running through a marsh or swamp

Lagniappe (lan' yap) Something extra that you didn't pay for--thrown in to sweeten the deal--like a baker's dozen.

Laissez les bons temps rouler (pronounced Lessay Lay Bon Ton Roulay) Let the good times roll. It's a party city.

Mardi Gras known as Fat Tuesday, the day before Lent...The day to celebrate before the traditional Catholic tradition of sacrificing and fasting during the 40 days of Lent.

"Who Dat?" (noun) A New Orleans Saints fan; A chant for New Orleans Saints fans: "Who dat? Who dat? Who dat say dey gonna beat dem Saints?"

Cajuns (kay'jun) - Cajuns are the French colonists who settled the Canadian maritime provinces (Nova Scotia and New Brunswick) in the 1600s. The settlers named their region "Acadia," and were known as Acadians. In 1713, the British took over Canada and demanded allegiance and that the Acadians adopt the king's Protestant religion. Over the next forty years, the Acadians' refusal to abdicate became a political and religious threat. The British government seized farms, burned villages, and expelled Acadian families to different destinations from all over New York to the West Indies. Many Acadians found some acceptance in Louisiana, with its strong French background and Catholic heritage. Here the Acadians eventually became known as "Cajuns." Cajuns developed their own distinct lifestyle in the swamps and surrounding areas of South Louisiana.

Creoles (cree' ole) - Cajuns aren't Creole, and a Creole isn't a Cajun. "Creole" can mean anything from individuals born in New Orleans with French and Spanish ancestry to those who descended from African/Caribbean/French/Spanish heritage. Creoles in New Orleans have played an important part in the culture of the city. Creoles, like Cajuns, have contributed so much to New Orleans art, music, cuisine, and social life; without them, New Orleans wouldn't be the unique city it is today.

A Note About Our Rates: The FULL rate is the actual cost of hosting the camper at St. Dorothy's. We ask families that can pay the FULL rate to do so. Our first scholarship tier is reflected in the PARTIALLY SPONSORED rate. No form is needed to receive the Partially Sponsored Rate. Our second scholarship tier is a CAMPERSHIP for families not in a position to pay the PARTIALLY SPONSORED Rate. You may request a CAMPERSHIP by completing and mailing in the camp registration form and a Campership Application will be mailed to you. No child is ever turned away from summer camp for inability to pay.

ALTAR KNEELERS – HISTORY



Some of our kneelers came from the original building. Two kneelers were presented to go across the raised altar platform. Rose Luca and Edna Keyes stitched these when father Tsu was our vicar (1960s). When the new church was designed, the altar was then in the shape of a hexagon now facing the congregation. Charles Ross, a famous liturgical artist and graphic designer, was commissioned by the ECW to design the new kneelers and corner

kneelers to surround the altar. Ross used the original kneelers in this endeavor for inspiration. (Colors, cross stitching patterns, biblical themes and backgrounds to construct present cushions). "Feed my lambs, feed by sheep" was in honor of Harry Stewart and were the first frontal designs. The altar guild commissioned a wedding kneeler for the apex. Funds, donations (including yarns from Danville knitting establishment), memorials. Mr. Ross supervised the church women to stretch these. ECW had him lecture and show his original works during coffees, teas and an afternoon show in the Parish Hall. We envisioned the kneelers against the wood of the church. Edna Keyes, Nancy Kindley, Mini Farmer, Lois Brassfield, Helen Robles, Gina Hodges and many volunteers brought forth this project.

Financial Highlights

2019 budget based on 144 pledges, with additional 8 pledges received so far in 2019. 2019 budget vs actual results, through February, were:

Expenses – Operating expense difference is the sum of lots of overs and unders, with main ones being:

Altar Guild about \$960 over budget.

Fellowship about \$870 under budget.

Administration about \$420 under budget.

Facilities about \$600 under budget.

Finance about \$1,300 over budget.

Contingency about \$2,000 under budget.

It is important to remember is that this is only the second month of the year and we have differences that are caused by pledges and bills occurring periodically and not consistently each month versus the budget assuming 1/12 of expenses each month.

The vestry met in Grace House on Tuesday, **March 19**, at 6:30 pm. (The vestry is meeting on Tuesdays instead of Wednesdays during Lent so that members can attend the Formation events on Wednesday evenings during Lent.)

MOTIONS:

The minutes of the January meetings, the several treasurer reports, the rector's report and the submitted commission reports were approved.

The vestry approved the draft 2018 Parochial Report to the Diocese of California

The vestry approved one signer for checks of less than \$500 from the Rector's Discretionary Fund when the need is urgent.

The vestry approved the use of the Episcopal Church records retention policy for St. Timothy's

The vestry approved the proposed allocation of money from the rectory maintenance and improvement fund to be used for the renovations of the rectory bathrooms.

The vestry approved the expenditure of memorial funds to replace one of the clergy mikes.

ACTION ITEMS:

Vestry will be assisting in the lock-up of church buildings on Sundays.

Vestry members will host coffee hour at least twice a year.

The Fellowship commission is working on refreshments for Easter Sunday

The vestry received an update on the Noah's Ark budget for 2018-2019. The anticipated deficit has been significantly reduced due to increased enrollment and a vacant staff position. Noah's Ark will have a fund-raiser this spring and is working on efforts to publicize the school.

Parish members are welcome to attend Vestry meetings. The next meeting is on Tuesday, April 9, 2019 at 6:30 pm in the Overby Conference Room in Grace House.

The minutes of the vestry meeting will be filed in the Parish Office after they are approved by the Vestry.
