ASSOCIATE RECTOR'S ARTICLE

Dear Friends.

A Blessed and Happy New Year to you!

As we enter the new year and the season of Epiphany, the season reminds us that all things change; we change! Unfortunately, the world continues to be gripped by this Pandemic. Just as we believe we are embracing a world looking toward less sickness and fear, we are hit with another wave of Covid 19. Here is where faith makes a difference. The angels point to a child being the Hope for the world. We are invited to change our perspective and share the power of God-with-us; Christ is making all things new, and we only have to have eyes to see, ears to hear, and companions in this journey of faith.

"So, if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new! All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation." (2 Corinthians 5:17-18)

The power of resilience comes with the ability to leave behind the baggage that no longer helps us journey with the Magi. We may leave behind the bandages that once helped us to protect our wounds but now trip us up, leading our soul to cry out for the freedom Christ promises us. As we bind up wounds and untie the strangling hold of what is no longer life-giving, may we remember that God forgives us and gives us mercy to forgive others so that together we may climb the great walls before us and clear the muddy ditches beneath us. When we look around, we see the grass growing green, the tree budding for leaves, and feel the promise of Spring. The liturgical year is a way of reminding us of all the different ways God comes to us in change and transformation, in forgiveness and healing, in new life and in death. The Spirit blows so that we know in our hearts what we need to know, that we might praise God for this great gift of Life.

Thank you to all of Saint Timothy's for the great generosity of the parish to the church and the community. Thank you from me and from Pastor Todd. Thank you for your words of encouragement to me and to one another, and for your gifts. Thank you especially to all the people who made our celebration of this Christmastide possible with flowers, song, service, technology—all kinds—at church and at home, altar guild and worship teams, vestry, pray-ers, counters, leaf-blowers, cookie makers, nativity picture sharers, and God's spirit at Saint Timothy's!

On January 17 we will begin hosting Winter Nights Shelter and we will support families who are unhoused for two weeks with Temple Beth Chaim. I ask for your prayers as well as your help, as we work toward the systemic change that will lead all people to a place of home and safety, giving thanks that we can offer a place of refuge until the hungry are fed and the unhoused are homed.

Winter Nights Shelter is Back! Following Covid protocols, and with the approval of the County Health Department, Winter Nights is once again providing a rotating shelter for families. With the help of our long-time partners, Beth Chaim, we will open the St Timothy's Parish Hall to become a Winter Nights Shelter serving approximately 30 guests (families with children). Volunteer duties will be covered by St. Timothy's the first week and Beth Chaim the second week.

Many Unmet Needs: Thank you to the many people who have already donated to the shelter or volunteered to help onsite. The families will be arriving in a couple of weeks and we still have many unmet needs:

- · Supply Donations Check the website for needed supplies.
- \cdot Meal Teams Onsite meal preparation or restaurant purchased/delivered meal the week of January 17 23.
- · Homework/Children's Helpers Help the children with their homework, read or play a game or craft project. We would love to have some teen volunteers.
- Overnight We need overnight volunteers for both weeks. Shelter staff is onsite at all times and responsible for the families. Overnight volunteers help with the facilities and put out breakfast supplies in the morning. Overnight volunteers can sleep in Grace House this year.

LIFE STORY GROUP


THURSDAYS AT 9:30 am, GRACE HOUSE LIBRARY

ST TIMOTHY'S BOOK GROUP - JANUARY



Indigenous Wisdom, Scientific Knowledge, and the Teachings of Plants

by Robin Wall Kimmerer

With deep compassion and graceful prose, botanist and professor of plant ecology Kimmerer encourages readers to consider the ways that our lives and language weave through the natural world. A mesmerizing storyteller, she shares legends from her Potawatomi ancestors to illustrate the culture of gratitude in which we all should live. In such a culture, everyone knows that gifts will follow the circle of reciprocity and flow back to you again... The grass in the ring is trodden down in a path from gratitude to reciprocity. We dance in a circle, not in a line. Kimmerer recalls the ways that pecans became a symbol of abundance for her ancestors: Feeding guests around the big table recalls the trees' welcome to our ancestors when they were lonesome and tired and so far from home. She reminds readers that we are showered every day with gifts, but they are not meant for us to keep... Our work and our joy are to pass along the gift and to trust that what we put into the universe will always come back. (Oct.) – Publishers Weekly
