This blend of remote and oncampus work will evolve as California reopens.

The position includes the following responsibilities:

- Greet visitors, answer telephones, and respond to voicemail/email
- Check USPS mailbox and manage mail to the appropriate channel
- Create and publish worship guides using Microsoft Word and ProPresenter
- Produce multiple worship documents prior to Holy Week (spring) and Christmas.
- Create a parish-wide email using Constant Contact
- Create, publish and distribute the church newsletter, both paper, and electronic versions
- Schedule ministry and community events using Google Calendar.
- Update church website using Weebly
- Produce Annual Parish report
- Assist and support clergy, volunteers, and other staff with projects, as needed.
- Attend staff meetings weekly and occasional committee meetings.

As a part-time position, sick pay and vacation are included after an introductory period. Healthcare is not provided.

If you have questions or suggestions, please let me know your thoughts.



PRAYERS FOR MY FAMILY ACROSS THE SEA

Jake H. is in High School and shares his perspective and reflection about Hong Kong. All of us are participants in events around the world because they affect our lives and the lives of our families.

Hong Kong is an economic powerhouse of a city south of China, with a population of seven million people. At first, this city was under British rule, with a democratic system closely relating to Britain. This was until 1997, when the handover of Hong Kong took place, and the United Kingdom returned control of this territory to China. With democratic roots, this city feels obliged to stand for and fight for their own rights of democracy.

Over the past years, several protests have taken place in the city of Hong Kong, with the most recent being the 2019 protests. This was in defiance of the extradition bill the Chief Executive, Carrie Lam, introduced. The bill would essentially allow for anyone members of the community to instead be tried in China instead of Hong Kong, with the former having stricter courts. Freedom is paramount to those with a democratic background, and over two million people protested in the streets of Hong Kong during the height of protest season. Many of my family members who live there still worry over the political tension brewing these past few decades. Several worry that their freedoms in life will be taken away due to this as well. So next time you see something about Hong Kong on the news, I hope that you will pray for them with me as well. - Jake H

VESTRY MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

St Timothy's Episcopal Church Vestry Highlights – January and February 2021

JANUARY - The vestry met on Wednesday, January 20, 2021 at 6:30 pm and on January 31 after the annual meeting

MOTIONS: The following motions were approved during the January meetings:

- Scott MacDougall was elected as Junior Warden for 2021
- Neal Matsunaga was elected Treasurer and Sally Shea Potts was elected Vestry Clerk for 2021
- Changes were made to the check signing authority for the several St. Timothy's bank and investment accounts to add Linda Clark (Senior Warden) and Scott MacDougall (Junior Warden) and to remove Dick Firth and Tom Linari who are no longer on vestry.
- The revised 2021 budget was approved as recommended by the Treasurer and the Finance Committee. The budget was revised from the version approved in December to reflect the updated pledges for 2021 and some changes to the allocation of pledge payments received in 2020.
- Letters of Agreement (LOA) for the staff for 2021 were approved documenting the pay increases approved in the 2021 budget. An Addendum is added to each employees LOA for any change to their pay or hours. Per a discussion with the bookkeeper, Steve Zimmerman, the 2021 budget reduces his hours to 5 per week. He informed the treasurer that this was sufficient to get the job done.

- The vestry voted to cap the **number of vestry members** in 2021 at 11 matching the current number.
- The minutes of the December 2020 vestry meeting and treasurer and other reports were approved.
- The vestry welcomed the 2021 vestry candidates to the meeting. They are: Ade Adekunle,
 Jacque Chiavini, Gabel Chung-Horsley, Cecilia Oduwole, and Steve Oki

Dick Firth thanked the retiring vestry members for their service. Retiring members are:

Discussion Items:

Property – Tom Linari reported we have a potentially expensive problem with the storm drain system for Grace House. The first segment of the storm drain system has been compromised by tree roots. We have received one bid and anticipate a second bid. Church Insurance has been contacted and will reimburse the church \$2500 for the damaged pipe. Tom also reported that three breaks in the Parish Hall hearing loop have been located and fixed. Additional breaks will be worked on and the loop tested by someone who uses hearing aids.

FEBRUARY

- The vestry retreat was held on Saturday, February 6. See the Vestry Listing in Tidings for which person on vestry has responsibility for which ministry.
- The new and some of the continuing vestry members met with Sally Shea Potts, Neal Matsunaga and Bev Matsunaga on Wednesday, February 17th for an introduction to parish systems for keys, expense reimbursements, the Google Drive, scheduling meetings, Publications, software used to facilitate parish communications and associated topics
- The vestry approved the annual Parochial Report for the national church and the Diocese in late February.

Parish members are welcome to attend Vestry meetings. The next meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, Marcy 17, 2021 at 5:00 pm. The minutes of the vestry meeting will be filed in the Parish Office after they are approved by the Vestry.

TREASURER'S REPORT

March 17, 2021

Financial Highlights

- Financial results through February are positive overall due to an underrun of Pledge Income offset by an overrun of Contributing Income and an underrun of expenses.
- The 2021 budget assumed 153 pledges for \$643,317 that had been received by the end of 2020 and forecast receiving an additional 6 pledges for an additional \$15,000. Through February the church has received an additional 5 pledges for \$11,360, 2 that were part of the forecast of 6 additional pledges and 3 that were new pledges.
- Year to date budget vs actual results, adjusted for amortizing "pledges paid in full" in the current year, are:

Pledge Income difference due to:

Underrun of about \$(3,640) in additional pledges forecast but not received and the balance due to budgeted pledge income not received.

Other Income difference due to:

Loose Plate \$(1,667), Facilities Cost Sharing \$(2,407) and Flower Donations \$(250) under budget offset by Contributing Income \$14,035 above budget.

Expenses – Operating expense difference is the sum of a number of over and under budget items, with the main ones being:

Personnel expenses \$2,687 under budget due mainly to \$1,150 underrun for paid musicians

Music expenses \$517 under budget

Christian Formation expenses \$199 under budget

Children & Youth Ministry expenses \$191 under budget

Fellowship expenses \$433 under budget

Administrative expenses \$1,216 under budget

Facilities expenses \$7,141 under budget Finance expenses \$6,695 under budget Contingency expenses \$464 under budget

Other Status

- Have started the process of preparing our request to have our PPP loan forgiven. The biggest challenge is the banks web tool for filing a forgiveness application requires payroll information for all employees (church and preschool) for 28 pay periods and for a window they call the "covered window" which is the period of time during which we are claiming to have spent the money on allowable expenses. We need to manually enter this data into the banks PPP portal tool and then to upload copies of the payroll reports for the 28 pay periods. Have spent about 16-20 hours so far and am expecting to spend at least another 5-10 hours before we are done.
- Audit of the church and preschool 2019 and 2020 books will be done this week with the auditor on site on 3/19. Audit will involve preparation by several people, for example Sally Potts for church annual meeting report and vestry meeting minutes, Bev Matsunaga for preschool billing and deposit information and for facility related documents like facility use agreements and church insurance policies, Carleen Carns for pledge information, myself for Finance Committee minutes and of course our bookkeeper Steve Zimmerman who is coordinating the audit and will provide access or copies of all financial records the auditor requires.
